

Do people have the **right** to behave unsustainably?

Dr Lionel Boxer

Dr Boxer has worked with organisations since 1981 to improve the quality of management and operations. In many cases his efforts have contributed to reduction and elimination of pollution, but sometimes little change occurs.

This led him to research what ensures effective dealings with sustainability issues and publish, *The Sustainable Way*. He was awarded Fellow of the Quality Society of Australasia, listed in *The International Who's Who of Quality*, and nominated for a Banksia Environmental Award.

He is a consultant with Intergon and an adjunct research fellow with the Centre for Management Quality Research at RMIT University, where he lectures, supervises research students and publishes.



The Discussion




